The LCOBA Curriculum Approval Process

There are two paths for initiating the approval of a curriculum proposal: One, when the process is initiated by the Assurance of Learning (AOL) Leadership Team; Two, when the process is initiated at the major level. NOTE: The AOL Leadership Team can only initiate proposals that affect Area F and the Senior College Core.

The process for approving curriculum proposals that are initiated by the AOL Leadership Team is as follows:

- 1. Recommendations for curriculum proposals may start at the AOL Leadership Team and must be approved there.
- 2. Recommended curriculum proposals approved by the AOL Leadership Team proceed to the major level and must be approved there.
- 3. Curriculum proposals approved at the major level proceed to the LCOBA Curriculum Committee for approval.
- 4. If approved by the LCOBA Curriculum Committee, curriculum proposals go to the LCOBA Executive Committee for approval.
- 5. If approved by the LCOBA Executive Committee, a general faculty meeting is scheduled so that a vote can be taken by the general faculty on the proposals.
- 6. General faculty votes on curriculum proposals.

The process for approving curriculum proposals that are initiated at the major level is as follows:

- 1. Curriculum proposals start at the major level and must be approved there.
- 2. Curriculum proposals approved at the major level proceed to the LCOBA Curriculum Committee for approval.
- 3. If approved by the LCOBA Curriculum Committee, curriculum proposals go to the LCOBA Executive Committee for approval.
- 4. If approved by the LCOBA Executive Committee, the chair of the LCOBA Curriculum Committee then sends out by e-mail all approved proposals to the general LCOBA faculty.
- 5. LCOBA faculty have one week to flag an individual proposal by informing the chair of the LCOBA Curriculum Committee.
- 6. Curriculum proposals that are flagged by 10% or less of the faculty are considered to be passed by LCOBA at the college level.
- 7. If an individual curriculum proposal is flagged by more than 10% of the faculty, then a general faculty meeting will be scheduled within 14 days for a general faculty vote on the flagged proposal.

However, if the curriculum change and/or addition in question affects Area F, the Senior College Core, or the college as a whole, a general faculty vote would automatically be required. Possible examples requiring exception to this proposal are: new majors or changes in GPA requirements.
