Pre-Requisites: MATH 1112 or 1113, BIOL 1107, and 1108 or permission of instructor.

<u>Course Description</u>: A survey of modern genetics including Mendelian modes of heredity; extensions and variations on Mendelian genetics; chromosomal inheritance and variation; molecular properties of genes; plus basic quantification of genetic diversity at the population level.

Course Outcomes: Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

- 1) Comprehend the basic terminology & principles of modern Mendelian Transmission Genetics from cellular meiosis to phenotype in the organism and relatedness to other sub-fields of genetics: Molecular & Population (BO2, BO3, & GE4, & GE7);
- 2) Extend upon basic Mendelian principles the understanding of chromosomal inheritance and how genes are regulated in an organism and quantified for a species within a population (BO2, BO4, & GE4);
- 3) Solve basic and more complex Mendelian genetics in the form of ratios/probabilities, chi-square test, pedigrees, and quantitative population genetic problem sets (BO1, BO4, BO5, GE3, GE5 & GE7).

These course outcomes support the VSU Biology Department Outcomes # 1-5 and the University General Educational Outcomes # 3, 4, 5 & 7 as listed in the VSU Undergraduate Catalogue (see below).

<u>Graded Course Components</u>: Your final grade will be based on your performance and participation on lecture exams, three homework problem sets, online quizzes, and final exam (see grade calculation & distribution below). There are no make-up or late assignments accepted.

Three Lecture Exams & Final (each 20%, up to 60%): Students will be tested on their comprehension or application of 1) lecture/reading material, 2) listed textbook chapter: comprehension, application/challenge questions & "try problems", and 3) assigned homework problem sets prior to each exam (below). There are three Lecture Exams (20% each) & one cumulative Final Exam (20%). The lowest exam score will be dropped. New this semester, exams will most likely be all online during the semester through the course Blazeview page (BV). More details as we progress through the course.

**Achieve Online Assignments (20%):** Assignments require a subscription to MacMillan Achieve. More information is available on the BV course site. Access should be available through the **Day 1 program** or you can directly register. Good advice is to start early on readings, homework problems, and **Achieve assignments**. Also, use the D2L Brightspace App to keep up with calendar due dates (see BV course site module).

**Lecture Quizzes & Assignments (20%):** Attendance is very important as this is a space where we can learn and practice genetics problems together. We will build on your foundation of biology knowledge (e.g. BIOL 1107/1108) as you progress into the upper division. During lecture we will take breaks and use practice quizzes (BV on your cell phone or other digital device) to see what you are learning and as practice for more formal exams. Genetics requires critical thinking skill such as solving problems and we will do this together in lecture. So, if 20% of your effort (grade) is simply attending lecture to engage in the content to help you learn, attend class.
