Course Description

Capstone is required for partial fulfillment of the requirements for the MLIS degree. Emphasis will be on synthesis of knowledge, honing writing and presentation skills, and creating a professional development plan.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Synthesize knowledge gained throughout the course of study and apply that knowledge to the consideration of current professional issues.
- 2. Make an effective professional presentation.
- 3. Write a paper of publishable quality.
- 4. Create a professional development plan.
- 5. Navigate the job hunting process.
- 6. Articulate personal professional goals.

Course Prerequisite or Corequisite: Taken during the final semester of study

Required Text

Rubin, Richard E. Foundations of Library and Information Science. New York: Neal Schuman. The edition you used in Foundations will be fine.

Assignments

Capstone paper: You will prepare a paper of publishable quality on a topic of your choice, with the topic subject to instructor approval. Paper length and style will depend on topic and on requirements of appropriate publication venues. Paper topic selection is due September 6. Draft due November 29. Final paper is due on the first exam day, December 9.

Capstone presentation: You will do a conference-style presentation about your research proposal for your Capstone Paper in Wimba Classroom. You will use PowerPoint slides to illustrate points and information. Your presentation will answer the following: Why

you selected the topic? Your approach to research. Your research questions or objectives. What you hope to find out. Make your presentation asynchronously and archive it.

Portfolio: You will update, present and discuss your portfolio. Discussion and sharing of portfolio issues will occur in BlazeVIEW. Feedback will be provided by the instructor and classmates. Revised portfolios are due on December 4, 2009, either in the Assignment Module or by mail or package service. After grading and review by other faculty members, notebook portfolios will be returned by mail or package service.

Professional Development Plan: Each student will create and record a personal plan for professional development. For students who need to seek employment, this will include a detailed job-hunting plan. For all students, this will include plans for solidifying and updating their professional knowledge in the two-year period following graduation. Submit via BlazeVIEW no later than October 4, 2009.

Reflection on MLIS Experience: Each student will prepare an essay that reflects on and evaluates his or her experience with the MLIS degree program. The essay will include the student's determination of strengths and weaknesses within the program. Submit via BlazeVIEW no later than November 1, 2009.

Current Issues Discussions: There will be six current issues discussions lasting one week. You or your team will moderate a class discussion of a current issue in LIS. You will use a topic that has appeared in LIS or popular literature during the past year. Current issue topics will be discussed during the first week of class. Topics are due for approval on August 28, 2009. The first topic will be selected in the first week discussion. For each topic, you will identify pieces of published literature that state all sides of the issue and you will prepare one or more questions to guide the discussion. Each team will summarize its discussion in BlazeVIEW no later than October 11, 2009.
